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ourageous Advocates

Our Curriculum Focus this year is challenging the children to do 'All We Can' and, this half term, they will continue to learn more about the wider world.

Our focus person is Greta Thunberg who began campaigning against climate change at just 15 years old. This has encouraged more young people to try to action change. Through studying her, the children will learn about how they can take some responsibility to make the world a better place and how, in Greta's own words, 'you are never too small to make a difference.'

In English this half term, the children will continue to work hard on applying all of the spelling, grammar and punctuation skills that they have learnt so far in their own writing. The texts that they will share and read will be related to our natural world and the environment. They will be encouraged to create their own texts based on what they have read.

Measures will be a focus in Maths this half term. The children will learn more about measuring time, length , mass and capacity. They will apply their calculation skills to help them to solve problems using different units of measure. The children will also be taught to recognise all of the UK coins and notes and solve problems involving money.

In RE, the children will be exploring the question 'Why is the Bible an important book?' and will be considering how it is used by Christians. Towards the end of the term, they will be thinking about the question 'What is Easter really about?' and reflecting on what Christians may think and believe about the event of Jesus' death and what can be learnt from it.

Holly Hill's Christian values will continue to be at the heart of everything we do. This half term the children will be learning about thankfulness, forgiveness, patience, honesty, hope and respect.
